

German Course, Level A1 (Part1)

Here are the topics of the course listed week by week

Week 1

Introduce yourself, say hello and say goodbye, Alphabet, statements.

Week 2

Verbs in the present singular and plural. Spell, count, ask about your profession.

Week 3

W-questions, question pronouns; Who? How? Where from? What? Du or Sie?

Week 4

Speaking about your own origin, giving personal information,

Definite and indefinite articles in the nominative, singular and plural nouns

Week 5

Saying and understanding phone numbers and addresses, ask about objects and naming objects. Verbs in the present tense 3rd person singular and plural, question pronouns: Where?

Week 6

Talking about home and furnishings, Yes / No questions, definite and indefinite articles in the accusative case

Week 7

Describing living situations, understanding apartment advertisements.

Negation with "keine", personal pronoun in the nominative

Week 8

Report about one's own family, describing family relationships.

Week 9

Possessive articles in the nominative singular, temporal adverbs

Revision.

Week 11

Plan a leisure program, talk about your own city, talk about the past.

Verbs with a vowel change, past tense of "haben" and "sein".

Week 12

Talking about leisure activities, asking for the time and answers.

Temporal indications, temporal prepositions.

Week 13

Describe a daily routine, make an appointment, make an appointment.

Separable verbs in the present tense

Week 14

Talk about eating habits, Imperative, "like" and "want"

Week 15

Have shopping talks, ask about prices. You like / not like.

Week 16

Talk about everyday working life.

Week 17

Modal verbs: "can", "must", "want".

Week 18

Ask for bank information and fill out transfers.

Week 19

Prepositions with dative: Where? Where? Where from?

At the end of level C2 you can understand and use colloquial and idiomatic expressions and use the language for challenging, academic contexts both orally and in writing. At the end of level C1, you can lead complex conversations $spontaneously\ and\ effortlessly, understand\ technical\ articles$ and technical instructions, express yourself in written form clearly and precisely at an adequate language level. At the end of level B2 you can follow longer contributions on abstract topics and understand news broadcasts. Orally you can communicate spontaneously and fluently and in writing you can comment on content personally and formally content. At the end of level B1 you can understand the essentials of a **B1** discussion when clear standard language is used and when familiar, concrete content is used. You can cope with most everyday situations, report on experiences and justify opinions. At the end of level A2 you will be able to understand frequently used expressions, when it has to do with simple information about daily life such as shopping, work, and family. You can describe your circumstances and things in simple terms and describe everyday life. At the end of level A1 you will be able to understand and use familiar expressions and simple sentences. You can introduce yourself, communicate information to persons and communicate in a simple way when a partner speaks slowly and is ready to help.
